# Lowells honored for giving dogs a 'Second Chance'

In December 2005, the League got a call about two puppies who had spent their first six months housed in a bathroom. Afraid of nearly everything and everyone, the two were brought to the Boston Animal Care and Adoption Center by one of our rescue specialists. The staff started the rehabilitation process, but it was determined the puppies required more one-on-one support.

Two of the League's long-time foster families, James and Susan Lowell and their daughter, Sue, were contacted to provide foster care to the puppies. The Lowells bonded so well, they decided to give the two young dogs, now named Shamus and Nathan, the permanent and loving home they so desperately needed.

What a difference a year makes! The dogs are now in great physical shape, but their mental scars are still there, as they are somewhat skittish under certain circumstances. But both Shamus and Nathan are enjoying a new lease on life. They walk daily in the woods around their respective homes, and they enjoy the company of the other Lowell dogs - who have been crucial in their recovery and continue to play a vital companionship role.

Without the Lowell's generosity and good will, Shamus and Nathan would not have progressed so beautifully. For giving them a "Second Chance," the Animal Rescue League of Boston extends the Lowells our warmest thanks and deepest appreciation.

## **ARL Introduces Foster Care Ambassador Program**

This spring, the ARL launched its Foster Care Ambassador Program (FCAP) in all three of its shelter locations in Boston, Brewster, and Dedham.

OFFF asked Maryann Regan, ARL's Director of Shelter Operations, to explain how the program will give deserving animals time out of the shelter — and help save more lives!

**OFFF:** What is FCAP?

Maryann Regan: FCAP is a fun and unique way of taking ARL's existing foster care program to the next level. Not only are lives saved, but space, time, and resources are freed up inside our shelter to care for more animals in need. We supply simple training and a few tools; our foster parents take it from there!

OFFF: How does FCAP differ from ARL's traditional foster care program?

MR: Essentially, FCAP is not much different than our existing foster care program. Our traditional program is focused on animals that are not quite ready for adoption due to age, medical issues, and behavioral challenges. With FCAP, the foster parents can bring home any animal they choose.

The biggest difference is that FCAP empowers our foster care parents to not only find loving homes for their foster animals, but also to adopt out the animals on their own. This means doing the adoption counseling, the paperwork that goes along with it, receiving payments for the adoption, and essentially sending the animal home without the animal ever having to come back to the shelter.

OFFF: I'm interested in becoming a foster parent through the FCAP program, but I don't have any training. Is that OK?

MR: Yes! Our expert staff will provide you with all the training and tools vou need to make it a successful adoption process.
